ARDUINO ELECTRONICS IN SECOND GRADE

Last week 2nd grade student in Sandy Figel's class learned some simple electronics using an Arduino micro-controller. Working in teams of three, students connected wires to different Arduino pins to build simple devices.

The students began by reviewing basic elements of an electrical circuit. Then, students examined different parts of an Arduino Uno – the input pins, the output pins, the microprocessor, and the power connection. The students learned how the Arduino can sense different inputs (for example light, sound and vibrations) and how it can control actions (for example lighting a light or turning a windmill.) The students got to learn firsthand how the pins on one side of the Arduino handle inputs and the pins on the other side handle outputs.



After the introductory lessons, the students worked in teams to solve three simple engineering challenges. In the first challenge, students had to find a ground pin and locate output pin 11 and connect them using wire to an LED. This challenge was complicated by the fact that the students discovered that even once the pins were connected, the LED would not light until they plugged in a battery pack. Once they got their light turned on, the students discovered how pins 8 -13 had been programmed with different blink patterns.



In the second challenge, students attached a motion or light sensor to one of the input pins and varied the input conditions to control the light (for example increasing or decreasing the light it received.) In the final challenge, students got to control a windmill with their input sensor. (Click here to see video.) The second graders were collaborative and creative and each team solved all three challenges.

Following their success with these challenges, the

2nd graders will be putting their Arduino skills to use to create an electronic reenactment of the final part of the Grinch story. Students will attach sensors along the path the Grinch travels and learn the simple programming commands needed to activate lights, fountains



and snow blowers as the Grinch makes his journey to Whoville. It should be quite fun!

GROCERY STORE SCAVENGER HUNT

All 3 preschool classes headed out to the market this week to help buy food to donate to the Stone Soup project in Queen Anne that is run at Brighton by Sue Elvrum. We also have been learning all about food groups and doing many activities around this. We divided in groups and went on a "scavenger hunt" to find many of the foods that we have been focusing on. We also met some real lobsters and crabs at the market, and even found a free cookie in the bakery. It was a fun outing and also one with true meaning! The soup will provide dinner for many people who are in need of a warm meal. Thanks preschool!

ART OF THE MASTERS - ALBRECHT DÜRER

In art, we will are studying the Northern Renaissance Master, Albrecht Dürer. He is known for his incredible detail and use of light and dark contrasts. Unlike most Renaissance artists, he painted animals,

contemporary people. landscapes, and addition to the religious subject matter of his contemporaries. He also wrote extensively about art, mathematics, other topics, making him a true Renaissance man. The Kindergarten and First Graders will paint a watercolor of some grass and add an insect or two. No subject was too small



for Dürer to pay close attention and he painted many pictures of turf. The Second and Third Graders will copy a symmetrical newspaper picture which has been cut in half. The students will try to use detail as closely as Dürer to make their half picture look just like the newspaper half. The Fourth and Fifth Graders will use charcoal to draw animals using light and dark contrasts to create the roundness of their animal, not unlike Dürer's owl or rabbit paintings. The Middle School art elective class will create self portraits using conte crayon to add light and shadow. Look for our detailed masterpieces to be appearing around school soon.

Our 2nd Annual Battle of the Books teams are forming



The "Hens" in all casts repeated their lines so well: "Who will help me plant the wheat, etc.?" and each of the animals answered "Not I" while performing the activity the book assigned to each animal (Goose leaned on the fence, Dog slept on the porch, and Cat preened in the mirror.)






BUY SCRIP! SUPPORT OUR PTO!
